A beacon of hope

Swiss light artist Gerry Hofstetter has been beaming images onto the face of the Matterhorn above the resort of Zermatt. The motifs vary: flags, hashtags, icons and short messages.

“Since the outbreak of the Corona crisis, we have been projecting symbols onto the Matterhorn every day. With the #hope campaign, we want to give people hope, call for solidarity and say thank-you to those who are currently doing almost superhuman efforts to maintain our infrastructure and healthcare.”

Each day Hofstetter consults with the mayor of Zermatt and the CEO of Zermatt Tourism to decide which image should be projected next. According to Hofstetter's team, the nightly displays have reached over 2.2 billion people via traditional, online and social media.

On 23 April it was Oceania's turn, and for a couple of hours the Southern Cross shone brightly over the Swiss Alps. It was live-streamed via the website www.zermatt.ch/en/hope and for those that missed it, images taken by photographer Michael Portmann were posted the next day.

The CSA Oceania reposted those photographs and messages on their facebook page www.facebook.com/Swissinoceania/ and incredibly, it was shared 2,500 times and over 350,000 people were reached within 48 hours. This gesture of solidarity and words of hope clearly touched many people as hundreds of messages were posted expressing appreciation and gratitude. *Ed*

The largest repatriation campaign in Swiss history

It is “the largest repatriation campaign in Swiss history” according to Hans-Peter Lenz, Head of the Federal Department of Foreign Affairs (FDFA) Crisis Management Centre. This is the result of the enormous efforts of Swiss diplomacy and dozens of FDFA collaborators all over the world beginning in Mid-March. 35 flights were organised to bring Swiss citizens stranded in Asia, Africa, Latin America and Oceania back to Switzerland. As of 27 April 2020, about 7000 people were brought back by this huge operation.

Australia

One of those special flights was out of Australia. It was the first time that an Edelweiss-airplane flew all the way to Sydney and then back to Zurich with a cargo of Swiss tourists on board who wanted to go back home.

Even before the Swiss Government decided on 28 March 2020 on the repatriation flight, Team Switzerland in Australia – the Embassy in Canberra and Consulate General in Sydney – was working in COVID-19 crisis mode. Following Swiss and Australian Government announcements, the Embassy and Consulate General teams had both started working on a roster alternating office presence and home-office.

The team experienced a massive increase of phone calls and e-mails from worried Swiss tourists, who heard from the Swiss Government that they should return home, who had their flights cancelled, who needed support. Team Switzerland, including our Honorary Consuls around Australia, had a huge job on their hands, informing our citizens via every available channel and regularly updating the constantly changing information. A special online form was created for Swiss tourists to register their interest in a flight home, and in no time some 570 people had provided their details.

More airlines cancelled their flights, more countries closed their borders and more airports prohibited passengers from transiting; the possibilities to fly back to Europe were getting fewer by the day. “At this point, we decided to send a plane to Australia to repatriate our blocked citizens”, remembers Pedro Zwahlen, Ambassador of Switzerland.

Team Switzerland had less than a week to send out information via the different online forms, the websites and facebook page. Hundreds of calls were answered. “We obtained clearance for the flight via diplomatic channels



and had to solve rather surprising questions like “are pets allowed on board”, “can I bring my surf board” “what about my bike?”, reminisce the colleagues.

The big day arrived on 4 April 2020. For the very first time, an airplane with the Edelweiss emblem on its tail was ready for boarding at the airport in Sydney!

Consul General Bernadette Hunkeler Brown and her team, supported by the country manager of SWISS International Airlines, were at the airport to give the final support to ‘our’ passengers. Some were tired, having had many days of uncertainty and worries or having travelled the day before or the same morning from other cities in Australia. In addition to our fellow Swiss citizens and through a great collaboration with other Embassies, citizens from Germany, Italy, France and other European countries were also able to return home with Edelweiss.

The Swiss Embassy and Consulate General appreciate the grateful feedback from many of the Swiss tourists after their return. “We extend our gratitude to all the colleagues involved in Australia and Switzerland, the Australian authorities, and, last but not least, to Edelweiss for the seamless collaboration!” says Consul General Hunkeler Brown.

Our files show that there are still nearly 500 visitors/tourists from Switzerland in Australia. Swiss authorities are recommending all Swiss tourists to fly home as soon as possible. Luckily, commercial flights are available again.

Pacific Islands countries

As the Pacific Islands countries declared a State of Emergency and imposed heavy travel restrictions and shut-downs to contain the spread of the Coronavirus, cases of Swiss travellers blocked in the most remote travel destinations in the Pacific popped-up in Vanuatu, Solomon Islands and Papua New Guinea from 25 March onwards.

As opposed to the group repatriation effort in Australia, the situation in the Pacific Islands required individualised case management for every single stranded tourist. “We had to analyse and contain the risks some of our fellow citizens found themselves in, identify alternative means of transport, communicate with national, provincial or local authorities,

negotiate with airlines to vacate space for transit passengers, co-ordinate with Embassies of other European countries the group evacuation of our citizens by chartered flights where no other means of transport would be available for the foreseeable future”, explains Swiss Ambassador and Special Envoy for the Pacific Islands Region, Yasmine Chatila Zwahlen.

Virtually all of our travellers stranded in the Pacific had to transit via Australia, as the transit option in Singapore no longer existed. In a number of cases, the Embassy had to appeal to Authorities to grant exemptions to the strict travel bans on compelling, compassionate and humanitarian grounds.

These were circumstances where Switzerland’s solid network of good relations in the region and beyond benefited our Swiss compatriots directly and immediately, who appreciated what ‘diplomatic channels’ could be used for.

At the time of writing this article, the majority of Swiss tourists in the mentioned countries had returned or were in the process of returning home. The Embassy remains in contact with the Swiss community which calls the Pacific home – many are supporting their neighbours in the local communities who face the economic and social hardships of the COVID-19 crisis which is now compounded by the arrival of a major animal disease and an insect pest in PNG as well as the devastation of Tropical Cyclone Harold in Vanuatu.

New Zealand

In New Zealand the COVID-19 crisis developed quickly, and the NZ Government responded very swiftly to close the border and soon thereafter commercial flights out of the country disappeared.

The Embassy staff in Wellington moved to home-office and had to deal with many stranded tourists. Luckily Qatar Airways managed to keep the daily flight from Auckland to Doha running until 19 April with connections to Zurich. The FDFA in Bern managed to send a SWISS Boeing 777-300ER repatriation plane to Auckland (via Bangkok) to get some of the stranded tourists back to Zurich. On Wednesday, 8 April at 3.45am the Ambassador, the Attachée and the Consuls’ family in Auckland met at the Auckland International Airport to process the 325 passengers. Only approved travellers were let into the terminal and with no e-tickets access had to be handled manually. Inside the terminal the check-in procedure was lengthy as everything had to be processed manually with hand-written boarding passes. 23 additional passengers that couldn’t get accommodated on the SWISS flight managed to get on a Lufthansa repatriation flight to Frankfurt a few hours

later, thanks to the close collaboration between the Embassies.

A huge effort by the small Embassy team in Wellington with support from the Consulate in Auckland. Judging from the facebook group comments many people were very grateful for this special flight. It was the first time a SWISS airplane was seen in NZ skies.

Swiss Sayings: Lost in Translation

Starting with this issue, the Swiss Review Regional Pages will devote a column to interesting sayings in our national languages, explained by Beatrice Schlegel – a professional translator and Swiss Abroad from Wales in the UK.

“Ma cha nöds Füferli und’s Weggli ha!”

This is a common saying in the German-speaking part of Switzerland. The English equivalent would be “to have your cake and eat it too.” A ‘Weggli’ is a typical Swiss soft bun/roll, brioche-like with a ridge down the middle (easy for breaking into two). A ‘Füferli’ is the smallest denomination of Swiss currency coins i.e. five Rappen.

Traditionally, a ‘Weggli’ used to cost five Rappen in the olden days. So keeping that five Rappen coin and still getting the piece of bread, is not an option, as nothing in life is for free.

The French translation is:

“Vouloir le beurre et l’argent du beurre!”

In Italian it can be translated as:

“Non puoi avere la botte piena e la moglie ubriaca!”

Meeting of the Council of the Swiss Abroad

Due to the Coronavirus pandemic, the meeting of the Council of the Swiss Abroad (CSA) on 14 March 2020 in Berne had to be cancelled. As a consequence – and as a first in the history of the organisation – the 127 delegates were asked to cast their votes electronically on matters that couldn't be postponed until the next meeting.

The Annual and Financial reports, the budget and the priorities for 2020 were accepted with a huge majority. Worth mentioning is:

- The partnership with the Cantonal Bank of Geneva and Swiss Tourism has been extended;
- The three existing websites aso.ch, revue.ch and SwissCommunity.org will be merged into one this year and fundamentally modernised so that they better meet the needs of the Swiss Abroad;
- Due to the e-voting setback, efforts will focus on enabling voters to receive voting material electronically until a secure e-voting system is available;
- The legal service of the Organisation of the Swiss Abroad (OSA) which provides free advice regarding emigration and also return to Switzerland processed 1,800 inquiries in 2019.
- The OSA takes on the secretarial function for independent foundations and funds for the benefit of the Swiss Abroad. Examples are:
 - E.O. Kilcher Fund (start-up aid for return migrants in need as well as additional scholarships for Swiss students abroad in Switzerland);
 - Fonds Freiburghaus (additional scholarships for Swiss students abroad in Switzerland);
 - Heinrich Huber Fund (help for needy Swiss, especially overseas).

Approved but more controversial were the directives for the direct election of the CSA delegates. They provide the legal basis for broadening the electorate and give all Swiss Abroad registered with a Consulate the right to elect their representative as opposed to elections by the Swiss Clubs. Whilst Australia and Mexico went through a successful pilot project in 2017, the voting system used then is not available anymore. Hence some questions regarding the implementation, which requires assistance of the local representations, remain and will need to be solved.

All in all, the delegates experienced a shortened and partly digitalised version of the yearly spring meeting. Whilst participation happened at low cost and in environmentally sound manner, the drawback was the lack of networking and lively discussions that lead to instant feedback, reflection and better understanding ahead of decision taking. Some of these downsides could have been made up by video conferencing. Given the next meeting is scheduled for August and international travel unlikely by then, this tool may be embraced at the next meeting despite the large number of participants. COVID-19 has also put the OSA on a steep learning curve!

The Swiss Old Age Pension

The Australian CSA delegates are often approached with practical questions related to the Swiss Old Age pension. This article summarises the three main topics.

Reaching retirement age – What to do?

The Swiss old age pension isn't paid automatically when you reach statutory retirement age. The Central Compensation Office (CCO) in Switzerland recommends submitting your pension claim no later than three months prior to reaching the statutory retirement age, as this will give the compensation office sufficient time to gather the information needed to calculate your pension. Annual Life Certificate – Why?

Every year the Swiss Compensation Office (CCO) sends a life and civil status certificate to all Old Age Pension recipients. This is to check that beneficiaries are still alive. The form must be completed, signed and witnessed by a competent authority (e.g. Honorary Consul) before returning it to the CCO

within 90 days. Failure to meet the deadline may lead to an interruption in benefit payments. New pension recipients first receive the form 12 months after their benefit entitlement begins.

Tax deduction from ATO – How to claim?

Once you are receiving an income from the Swiss Social Insurance (AHV/AVS or IV/AI) you may be entitled to claim a deduction, to reduce the amount of tax you pay in Australia.

The deduction applies to your personal contributions towards your Swiss Social Insurance in Switzerland (including voluntary contributions made while residing outside of Switzerland). In order to allow the ATO to determine your eligibility, you will need to request a statement from the Swiss Compensation Office, which certifies the total amount of your personal contribution paid into the

Swiss Social Insurance. Follow the steps below to lodge your claim:

Step 1:

Request a statement from the CCO in Geneva relating to your personal contributions into the Swiss Social Insurance. Click on <https://bit.ly/2yQshE1> for the Swiss request form.

The Swiss Compensation Office will check the request and send you a statement via mail that contains your personal contribution figure.

Step 2:

Submit the statement from Switzerland to the ATO along with a request to determine the deductible amount. Click on <https://bit.ly/2VLTVeK> for the Australian request form.

The ATO will advise you on the amount you may claim as deduction in a private ruling.
