NHL Players Win First Ever Swiss Impact Award

The Swiss Consul General in New York, Ambassador Niculin Jäger presented the first ever Swiss Impact Award to the four leading Swiss ice hockey players on the New Jersey Devils. The award recognizes outstanding Swiss achievements in the United States.

Introduced as the "Fantastic Four", Ambassador Jäger acknowledged the shared success of the Swiss NJ Devils players. The Consulate honored Captain Nico Hischier, the first overall draft pick of the 2017 NHL Entry Draft, as a pillar of the team. Jonas Siegenthaler was mentioned as a critical defender of the Devils and a key contributor to the Devils' current success in the NHL. Right-winger Timo Meier, a Swiss top player, joined the Devils recently and has made a name for himself as an indispensable player in the NHL. Akira Schmid was honored for his strong performance as a goaltender.

The team at the Consulate worked in overdrive in the days leading up to the ceremony to create a suitable setting for the occasion, and when the day finally arrived, we were proud, excited and a little starstruck. This first award was presented in the category of sports. It is special how sport, unlike other sectors, has a very inclusive effect. Fans feel honored when their team wins and their compatriots feel proud and celebrate when their athletes succeed. Listening to the ambassador's words, his joy for the successful hockey players shined through.

Nico Hischier said: "It's an honor to receive the award. It is definitely something special, and it shows how much support we are getting from Switzerland. A whole country that supports us. And it's just great to see that Switzerland does things like this." Looking ahead, Jonas Siegenthaler stated: "Now we are about 12 players in the whole league with four of them in New Jersey. That just shows how Swiss hockey is growing and I hope that we can continue like this in the future."

Thanks to the presence of Swiss TV and NJD TV, along with the large interest of Swiss and local media outlets, many Swiss and Devils fans were able to view the coverage in the days following the ceremony. The Swiss Impact Award has been very popular on social media channels. The players are creating a lot of affinity for Switzerland in the US. We were also able to welcome important decisionmakers and official representatives from New York and New Jersey to the Swiss residence on the occasion.

With our best wishes and the Swiss Awards in hand, the "Fantastic Team" eventually departed. The team at the Consulate is looking forward to hosting them again, and celebrating future trophies.

The Maurice Rohrbach Fund for Swiss-American Cultural Exchange

The exhibition featured 200 works by Oppenheim and was organized by The Museum of Modern Art, New York, Kunstmuseum Bern, and The Menil Collection, Houston.

Following the exhibition tour, the new Consul General of Switzerland in New York, Ambassador Niculin Jäger, invited the group for a cocktail reception at the Swiss Residence. A highlight was a generous offering by Executive Chef Yannick Germanier of Swiss cheeses, breads, and wines.



To commemorate the occasion, on behalf of the MRF, President Josephine Burri presented the Ambassador and his wife Gabriela with a "housewarming gift", an Ambrosia Maple sphere created by Swiss woodturner, Philip Hauser, who is represented by the Museum for Art in Wood in Philadelphia.

Ms. Burri also gave the Ambassador an antique letter opener handcrafted by descendents of Ernest "Mooney" Warther (1885-1973), who was a Swiss wood carver and knife maker and founder of what is now Warther Cutlery in Dover, Ohio. The letter opener was made possible by MRF Board member Richard Warther and is a rare surviving example of these openers, which have been given as gifts to at least four United States Presidents and countless Congressmen and Senators.

Our 2023 General Meeting and luncheon was held at our traditional Restaurant in White Plains, NY. The attendance was below the previous years, due to the fact that many of our long-time members are no longer ready to drive their cars too far.

Nevertheless, we spent a few hours reminiscing about the past, but also the future course of our society. The discussion ended with the outlining of our program for this year, which includes, our Jass Tournament, the Spring Outing, an evening listening to our favorite band the "Ancient Ruins" during the summer, a Fondue Party in the fall, ending with a Christmas Party in December.

With this variety of events all members should find one or more to attend despite their busy schedule.



The Swiss Alps 100 trail race offers some of the best trails and views of the famous Swiss Alps. The start is very similar to the Western States 100 with a challenging 4.5 mile climb and an elevation gain of 3,850 feet to the first aid station. All courses now run along the longest glacier in the

Swiss Alps, the 14-mile long Aletsch Glacier, which was declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 2001. It's a real privilege to be there. Along the way, there are three suspension bridges, a large dam, many small villages, and cows to feast your eyes on. The Swiss Alps 100 is also one of only 6 races in the world that is a qualifier for the WS100, HR100 and a preferred qualifier for the BW135.



We offer four different race distances, a Vertical 10k (6,020 feet of elevation gain), a 50k (10,930 feet of elevation gain), a 100k (21,130 feet), and the 160k with an incredible 34,380 feet of elevation gain. Think Hardrock 100, but in Switzerland. We are also the only ultrarunning event to offer a fly division. And of course, kids ages 4 to 13 can come and run a short distance for free.

We've grown a lot since our first race in 2017. We had 50 registrations for our first event, and last year we had 511 runners from 26 countries. This year, we are on track to have over 800 runners from at least 50 countries. We are looking forward to hosting another fantastic event this August.

Louisiana: Swiss American Society of New Orleans (SASNOLA)

New Orleans celebrated Mardi Gras on February 21. Many of our SASNOLA members participate in the various Carnival Krewe activities that take place during the time between Twelfth Night, January 6, and Fat Tuesday. From the better-known parades that pass through the crowded streets of the city, to the lesser known small krewes that parade through more residential neighborhoods, to the Marching clubs, balls and over the top extravaganzas, to simply being a participating spectator on the street during the most wonderful time of the year, Mardi Gras truly offers something for all to enjoy.

The 26th New Orleans French Film Festival was held March 9-19 this year, and included screenings of two French films with Swiss connections. On March 9, opening night of the festival, we were escorted to the Prytania theater by SASNOLA member Janet Darsie, also a member of "The Merry Antoinettes", a local ladies Mardi Gras Krewe who tout themselves as "being cheeky, glamorous revelers of Marie Antoinette's Court". The opening night crowd was also treated to live music prior to *Madeline Collins*, a narrative feature about a French woman living and working in Switzerland.

On March 10th we gathered at St. James Cheese before going to see *The Art of Silence*, a Swiss documentary about Marcel Marceau who was French but had a Swiss connection helping other Jewish people escape into Switzerland during WW2. Honorary Consul of Switzerland in New Orleans, Alexandra Mora, gave opening remarks, welcomed movie goers, and introduced the film. The film screening was sponsored by the Swiss Consulate in Atlanta.

On March 13, prior to the last two 'in person' films of the festival, all French Film Festival attendees were welcomed to a Garden Reception with the Nous Foundation at the BK House & Gardens in the French Quarter. Boasting a bit of Swiss history itself, the BK House was home to merchant and first Swiss Consul to New Orleans, John Merle, his wife, Anais and their three children, Henry, Eugenie and Corrine from 1833-1841. Coinciding with The French Film Festival in New Orleans in March, the so-called Francophonie, which pays homage to the French language and the cultural heritage of French-speaking countries, is also celebrated here. As French is one of the four national languages of Switzerland and because New Orleans has a rich French cultural and historical legacy, the Consulate General of Switzerland in Atlanta partnered with Alliance Française New Orleans, to promote the French language by screening *La Ligne/The Line*. The film was produced by the Swiss filmmaker Ursula Meier in the partially French-speaking canton of Valais. The family drama was nominated at the Berlinale for the Golden Berlin Bear 2022 in the category of Best Film. The Swiss-Belgian co-production premiered in February 2022 and is currently nominated in five categories for the Swiss Film Award.

For the second time in March, Honorary Consul of Switzerland in New Orleans, Alexandra Mora, also a SASNOLA member, was invited to give opening remarks prior to the film screening. Our President, Don Schwarzenbach, also serves as secretary on the Alliance Francaise board, and with SASNOLA member Jim Holmes serving as their treasurer, it only seemed fitting that SASNOLA would join in to cosponsor the pre-screening reception with offerings of Swiss wines, meats, and cheeses, Swiss confections and chocolates. With a 'Swiss Swag Bag' raffle sign in sheet, the event not only served as an opportunity to make new acquaintances, but also to promote our Society, and attract new members.

The movie was shown in French with English subtitles, in the backyard garden, under the stars at Alliance Francaise in New Orleans. It was a lovely ending to a month filled with small group get togethers of Swiss/French movie watching events. We are grateful to The Consulate General of Switzerland in Atlanta, the Consulate of Switzerland in New Orleans, and Alliance Française New Orleans for bringing this all together and making us a part of this delightful event.

The Telephone Exercise Class at the Swiss Benevolent Society

As the Covid pandemic lockdown (back in April of 2020) began to limit our members' freedom to get out, walk and socialize, the SBS decided to experiment with something to address these very important day to day life activities.

Our telephone exercise class, led by Elise Karras, one of our social workers and a certified personal fitness trainer, was launched in May 2020. The focus of the class was (and is) to help people maintain current levels of functioning by engaging in age appropriate and targeted movements.

Many of our Swiss members had been avid walkers throughout their lives. We anticipated the impact of lockdown was a serious one, which would limit mobility and cut back on socialization. There were many Zoom exercise classes during this time, but many of our members were uncomfortable with this platform, in fact, some did not have computer access at home. We determined that everyone was comfortable with the telephone, so we used a conference call model to conduct the exercises. Most exercises are chair exercises which can be done standing, so there is no exclusion as to who can attend.

The class started in May 2020 with 7 members initially with a simple warm up, functional exercises using body weight, balance exercises and cool down. Within the first year, one of our members volunteered to choose a selection of music each week for a segment of movement to a beat and sound. At some point later, another member suggested a meditation before physical exercise, which she offered to conduct. Members were enthusiastic about it, and we incorporated it into the beginning of each class. Concentration and coordination are continually being challenged during the class as we have progressed to moving all planes of body movement. There have been complementary benefits to this long running class. As each exercise is clearly and carefully explained, participants are regularly asked "can you see what I am trying to say"? As a cognitive exercise, this question brings awareness to one's own body and movement thus it enhances memory and visualization so that the exercise is correctly done. And yet another benefit has been the socialization aspect. Members know one another (after 3 years on the phone) and will often call into the conference call earlier than scheduled in order to chat with one another.

Meeting twice a week for an hour each time, the class continues going strong until this very day in 2023 and we now have 13 participants!
