Guide Days Folkfest at Edelweiss Village + Resort in Golden, BC -A Swiss Legacy Comes Alive in the Canadian Rockies

On October 18 and 19, 2025, Edelweiss Village + Resort in Golden, British Columbia, welcomed more than 600 visitors for the inaugural Guide Days Folkfest, a joyful celebration of the Swiss mountain guides who helped shape Canada's alpine culture.


For two days, the historic Swiss chalets came alive with alphorn music, yodelling, folk dancing, and guided tours that brought to life the story of the pioneering guides who first settled in Golden more than a century ago.

Families filled the grounds, children played in the Family Fun Zone, and guests enjoyed traditional Swiss food prepared by Valbella and local partners. Music echoed across the property from morning to evening, with performances by artists from Golden, Calgary, and beyond.

For many Swiss living in Canada, Guide Days was a rare chance to reconnect with a remarkable chapter of shared history. The Village, built in 1911 for the original Swiss guides hired by the Canadian Pacific Railway, remains one of the most unique Swiss heritage sites outside of Switzerland. Today, a major restoration effort led by Montayne is bringing this historic place back to life as Edelweiss Village + Resort, with renovated chalets now open for overnight stays!







Folkfest's success was made possible thanks to the dedication of volunteers, local partners, and generous sponsors who helped create an event filled with music, culture, and Swiss hospitality. Plans are already underway for Guide Days 2026, to continue the celebration with new activities and performances.

For Swiss across Canada, Edelweiss Village stands as a living bridge between the Alps and the Rockies. With the chalets now restored and the resort opening its doors, it's an invitation to rediscover this extraordinary chapter of Swiss history on Canadian soil.



Rencontres et échanges – retour sur les derniers mois:

Au cours des derniers mois, le Consulat général de Suisse à Montréal a célébré ses 150 ans de présence consulaire à Montréal à travers de nombreux échanges avec la communauté suisse et ses partenaires au Canada.

Le 18 septembre s'est tenue la traditionnelle Soirée Suisse, un moment fort du calendrier consulaire réunissant chaque année des représentantes et représentants du monde politique, économique, culturel et diplomatique. Dans une atmosphère conviviale, les invités ont pu renforcer les liens existants et en tisser de nouveaux entre la Suisse et le Canada.

Début octobre, l'équipe du Consulat a participé, en collaboration avec Les Amis de la montagne, à une activité environnementale sur le mont Royal. Ensemble, les collaboratrices et collaborateurs ont planté arbres et arbustes, contribuant ainsi à la régénération du milieu naturel et à la promotion de la durabilité au cœur de Montréal.

Peu après, la conférence annuelle des représentations suisses au Canada s'est déroulée à Montréal. Les représentantes et représentants de l'ambassade, des consulats généraux et des consulats honoraires se sont réunis pour échanger sur les priorités communes. La rencontre s'est ouverte par l'adoption symbolique d'un arbre au Jardin botanique de Montréal, symbole de croissance et de coopération durable.

À la fin octobre, le Consulat général a appuyé le Swiss Business Hub Canada lors des Regional Meetings Americas de Switzerland Global Enterprise. Les échanges ont porté sur la collaboration économique et les opportunités d'innovation. Un moment marquant fut la visite du Mila – Institut québécois d'intelligence artificielle, où les discussions ont porté sur le rôle de l'IA dans le soutien aux PME suisses à l'international.

Pour conclure, un déplacement en Nouvelle-Écosse a permis à la Consule générale de faire sa première visite officielle dans la province et d'inaugurer, au Musée canadien de l'immigration du Quai 21 à Halifax, une plaque commémorative célébrant les liens durables entre la Suisse et le Canada. Les rencontres à Pubnico et Millbrook ont offert un aperçu inspirant du patrimoine culturel et linguistique de la région.

Connections and Exchanges – A Look Back at Recent Months

In recent months, the Consulate General of Switzerland in Montreal has pursued numerous opportunities to engage with the Swiss community and local partners across Canada.

On September 18, the traditional Soirée Suisse took place – a highlight that each year brings together representatives from politics, business, culture, and diplomacy. In a warm and welcoming atmosphere, guests strengthened existing ties and forged new connections between Switzerland and Canada.



In early October, the Consulate team joined Les Amis de la montagne for an environmental initiative on Mount Royal. Together, the two teams planted trees and shrubs – a tangible contribution to biodiversity and sustainability in the heart of Montreal.

Shortly thereafter, the annual meeting of the Swiss consular network in Canada was held in Montreal. Representatives from the Embassy, Consulates, and Honorary Consulates met to exchange ideas and discuss shared priorities. The gathering opened with the symbolic adoption of a tree at the Montreal Botanical Garden, representing growth and sustainable cooperation.

In late October, the Consulate General joined the Swiss Business Hub Canada in hosting the Switzerland Global Enterprise Regional Meetings for the Americas. Participants from across the Americas discussed economic collaboration and opportunities for innovation. A highlight was the visit to the Quebec Artificial Intelligence Institute (Mila), where discussions focused on how AI can support Swiss SMEs in their international expansion.

Finally, a visit to Nova Scotia concluded these active months. In Halifax, a commemorative plaque was unveiled at the Canadian Museum of Immigration at Pier 21, celebrating the enduring bond between Switzerland and Canada. Meetings in the communities of Pubnico and Millbrook offered inspiring insights into the region's cultural and linguistic richness.

Riding the "Palm Express" - A Travel Account by Robert F. Rinkoff

My wife and I booked a scenic trip on a Swiss PostBus route called the Palm Express. It's a four-hour journey that starts in St. Moritz, descends to the Bergell region via the Maloja Pass, continues into Italy, re-enters Switzerland at Gandria, and ends at Lugano's main train station. That's the official route description. What that doesn't tell you is what can happen along the way!



On the day of our trip, we arrived early at the St. Moritz bus station, hoping to secure good seats. Soon, people began milling around the area where the bus would park. It arrived 15 minutes prior to departure. The driver got out for a break and shut the door. By then, most passengers had already formed an orderly line. The driver returned some 10 minutes later, unlocked the door, and left again.

Now, passengers who hadn't lined up swarmed all around us, creating a disorderly - distinctly "un-Swiss" - crowd clamouring to board the bus and grab good seats. We noticed four older women at the side of the bus - elbows raised high swiftly fighting their way to the door. Nobody dared resist these seniors who thus managed to be the first on board, claiming the four front seats. Even though we had been the first to arrive, we ended up sitting about two-thirds toward the back.

With everyone now seated, the driver returned, picked up a clipboard, and began calling passengers. "Rinkoff, two people?" "Here," I replied. He pointed to the first two seats on the passenger side - currently occupied by two of the four women who had boarded first. As we headed toward the front, a brief but heated argument in Swiss-German ensued between the driver and the women, who eventually - and very unhappily moved to the back while we took our prime front-row seats in disbelief. All other passengers were called in turn and redirected to their designated seats. As it turned out, seats were assigned by reservation order. We had been the first to book and were now rewarded with the first and best seats this restored our faith in Swiss orderliness!

Leaving St. Moritz, the bus followed the relatively flat main road past the picturesque lakes of Silvaplana and Sils, then descended the Maloja Pass. After the pass, we entered the extremely narrow Bergell Valley, where rough, imposing granite mountains loomed above the stony valley floor. The mountains felt foreboding, especially on the valley's south side, where the range is dominated by Monte Disgrazia - not the most inviting name for a mountain!



In many places, the road was only a single lane wide and ran so close to houses on either side that an outward-opening front door would be knocked off its hinges by a passing bus.

On a previous holiday, I had spent a week hiking in the Bergell and visited Alberto Giacometti's birthplace and grave site in Borgonovo. His sculptural style featured rough, heavily textured surfaces - I couldn't help thinking that the craggy landscape surrounding Stampa, where he often worked, must have exerted a major influence on him.

Once in Italy, the winding two-lane road was quite narrow, and the wide bus took up almost all of its lane. For long stretches, an ivy-covered stone wall bordered the right-hand side. There was no shoulder or footpath - just the wall. From our front-row seats, we watched the passenger-side mirror that extended from its arm. For long periods, the bus hugged the far right of our lane, and the mirror gently brushed against the ivy without ever touching the wall. The driver's precision amazed us; the bus flowed with traffic as if it were on an open road.

Toward the end of the trip, something extraordinary happened. We were driving along Lake Lugano, the water to our left. Traffic was heavy and occasionally stop-and-go, and our lane was thick with cars. While we were stopped on a bend, a large cement truck approached slowly opposite lane. As it rolled up, it became clear there wouldn't be enough space for it to pass. Traffic was now stopped in both directions and our bus was trapped. Men got out of their cars to advise the truck driver. Eventually, the truck nosed into a driveway, creating an opening of about a meter between its rear and the side of our bus. We inched forward cautiously.

At precisely that moment, a motorcycle shot through the gap from behind us. Everyone on the road shouted in surprise. Then, just as the gap narrowed, another bike raced through. People went wild - yelling, applauding, laughing, and cursing at the madness of it all! Not long after, traffic cleared and we rolled on through the final part of our trip.

The scenery on this route was beautiful, but for us, the bus ride itself was the highlight of a trip we'll never forget!
